Museum Curator a.k.a. Artifact Detective

Museums & Archives preserve **ARTIFACTS** so that people today and, in the future, can learn about people, places, and events through time.

ARTIFACTS are things – books, furniture, tools, clothing, letters – that we use as evidence to help understand those people, places, and events.

CURATORS work in Museums & Archives and care for **ARTIFACTS**.

Part of their job is to research and write about **ARTIFACTS**. They do this by asking questions like:

What does it look like? What is it made of/from?

When is it from? What is it used for? Who made this? Why did they make it?

Sometimes those questions lead to even more questions, and that's O.K. it's part of research.

Using this worksheet you'll become a CURATOR in training. Use it to make observations and ask question about your ARTIFACT.
